The need is so significant, in fact, that in its 2015 Facts and Figures Report, the Alzheimer's Association recently estimated that one in three seniors suffers with Alzheimer's disease or another type of dementia related illness. "The CDP training was an intensive all day training that used practical real world examples so our staff can better serve our residents with Alzheimer's or dementia," said Blewett.

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
